


Cycle A

Reading frequently to children, and engaging them actively in stories, non-fiction, rhymes and poems, and then providing them with extensive opportunities to use and embed new words in a range of contexts, will give children the opportunity to thrive. Through conversation, story-telling and role play, where children share their ideas with support and modelling from their teacher, and sensitive questioning that invites them to elaborate, children become comfortable using a rich range of vocabulary and language structures.

Each half term we choose 6 books that will help to develop our conversations and vocabulary. The books each have a unique reason for being part of the super six. Books are chosen that represent:

- a quality text,
- rhyming and repeated refrains
- diversity
- traditional tale from many different cultures
- wellbeing and growth mindset
- topic focus

Researchers in the United States who had looked at the impact of parents reading with their children quoted the following figures in a news release about their findings: Here's how many words kids would have heard by the time they were 5 years old:

- Never read to, 4,662 words;
- 1–2 times per week, 63,570 words;
- 3–5 times per week, 169,520 words;
- daily, 296,660 words;
- and five books a day, 1,483,300 words.9
