COVID-19 Return to School Arrangements

Return to School in September 2021

Government guidance now allows school to remove the **bubble structure**, **other social distancing measures** and **control measures** that have been in place for children. Our school will be doing this from September 2021. Government guidance means we can now revert many aspects of school back to how school was working before the pandemic started.

However, we need to be clear that the pandemic has not gone away and as per government guidelines, we now need to learn to live with Coronavirus. As such some general measures will need to remain in place. From time to time, our arrangements may need to be reviewed in the event of any increase in infections or changes in government guidelines.

Below details some key changes to be aware of.

The School Day

The school day will revert back to normal hours (doors open at 8.45am, the day ends at 3.20pm) for all classes as of *Thursday 2nd September 2021*.

We ask parents to be at the relevant entrance point promptly at **8:45 am** to support the organisation of the school day. Ensuring your children are in school promptly has a huge impact on their learning.

Entrance and Exit Points

During Covid-19 pandemic we have used different ways of entering and leaving our school site. At the start of the Autumn term all children will now enter school via the same entrance (Sunnyhurst door). At the end of the school day, both Roddlesworth and Anglezarke children will exit via the office doors. Sunnyhurst will exit from their normal door. As with all school procedures, we will be evaluating this as we move through the autumn term.

Collecting children at the end of the day. School finishes at 3:20pm. Parents and Carers should line up and wait at the relevant points (on the pavement outside school) to collect children in an organised and orderly way. Children will be handed over to the parents in an organised way and leave the school site promptly. We kindly ask that all parents/carers refrain from entering the school site during the month of September whilst we embed our new routines with the children.

P.E

Getting changed for P.E is a key part of children becoming independent. We are therefore asking that all P.E kits are once again brought into school for children to get changed into on the days they have lessons planned- PE days will be shared with parents via the school website.

Lunchtimes and Break Times

Children will once again be eating together in the hall and playing with other year groups on the back yards both at playtimes and lunch times. Children having packed lunches can now use their own choice of packed lunch bag. We ask that parents with children in Anglezarke and Roddlesworth classes continue to provide their child(ren) with a healthy snack for morning break- we will not be providing toast.

All children should have a fresh water bottle in school daily.

Sunnyhurst class will be continuing with their very successful rolling snack offer and children do not need to bring snack in from home. Parents will be asked to pay via Parentpay for snack provision in Reception and Year 1.

Assemblies

During the last eighteen months whole school assemblies have not been permitted in the hall. We know the importance of physically coming together as a whole school community and will once again be holding our weekly celebration assemblies every Friday (this will start at the end of our first full week back). We are very excited to be able to invite parents in too.

School Events and Clubs

School events have changed dramatically over the last eighteen months with many meetings taking place virtually and many usual events being unable to take place in the normal way. As we move through the autumn term we will be keeping you fully informed of any school events and clubs we are able to hold. I hope everyone understands that at this point we are not in a position to outline **any extracurricular** *clubs* or *key events* and *we will do this upon the return of school in September.*

Key Control Measures

During the last eighteen months, school has functioned incredibly successfully and is now confident and experienced in working in the pandemic. As school reopens in September 2021 we will continue to have key control measures in place to prevent transmission of the virus which are in line with Government guidance.

3. Keep occupied spaces well ventilated	
When your school is in operation, it is important to ensure it is well ventilated and that a comfortable teaching environment is maintained. Refer to <u>Simple steps to Good Ventilation</u> and the <u>Ventilation Checklist</u>	All rooms in the school have windows which are opened to create air flow and ventilation. Where possible windows will be left open during lessons, if this is not practical, windows will be fully opened when unoccupied to fully purge the air.
	At key points in the day ventilation is also improved through opening doors. At these times, increased consideration will be given to security of the building. All doors and windows will be closed at the end of the day. Any areas of school where there is poor ventilation will be identified and concerns addressed with the building surveyor.
	Co2 tests purchased- regular checks in all areas will be taken to ensure that air flow remains at an acceptable level at all times.
